
JACKSON STATE UNIVERSITY

At Jackson State University in Mississippi, one of the nation's largest Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), InterVarsity student leaders experienced revival on campus. Their once-thriving chapter was on the brink of closure because of COVID restrictions. By the time campus re-opened, just one student remained.

Thankfully, that one student, Kaiyah, was passionate about outreach. She and her staff, Smiley, along with a few other students, caught a vision to fervently pray for their campus.

Through their prayers, a new move of the Spirit broke through, igniting an unprecedented season of transformation and new life. Times of prayer and worship exploded in frequency on campus. Students gathered spontaneously to pray, seeking God's face for healing in each other's lives.

"We got to a place of knowing that prayer was the key," said Markyel, one of those students. "We weren't just praying at InterVarsity meetings; we were praying outside of them. Prayer got so contagious with us that we were doing prayer circles [in the campus plaza]." During a time of spontaneous, public prayer, students walking by began to stop to receive prayer — seven of them decided to follow Jesus for the first time. +

Jackson State's student leaders continued to see their prayers yield new life. Last semester, they gave weekly calls to faith at their events, and over 40 more students responded and said yes to Jesus.

In this season of blessing and breakthrough, these students still focus squarely on the Lord. "There's a lot going on on this




campus. We're surrounded by a lot of chaos," Kaiyah said. "[But] I know that with our relationship with God, we can change the whole university."

More Welcoming

G en Z is three times more likely than previous generations to express feelings of profound loneliness. But with your help, InterVarsity chapters met Gen Z in their isolation this year, inviting them into 1,052 loving and welcoming communities.

"I just want everyone to feel welcomed."

"I wasn't seeking God. He was seeking me," said Kathy, a student at Hunter College.



As a freshman, Kathy was shy and dealing with a dark season of depression. But then,

two friends invited her to InterVarsity and she immediately felt drawn to the community. "Once I walked in, I felt like I was welcomed." She felt comfortable and cared for by the friends she met and even opened up about her mental health.

When asked if she would be willing to help invite new students to InterVarsity, Kathy said yes — despite not yet being a Christian.

"I just want everyone to feel welcomed, which is the reason why I did [New Student Outreach] ... When I first started, I wasn't a Christian...I was nervous. I didn't know what to say."

Yet during that semester, Kathy and her chapter connected with over 2,000 students.

Kathy saw how her InterVarsity friends, including those she invited into the community, were changing and healing. As she thought about her own faith, she realized she wanted to take the next step.

"I was like, 'I think I'm ready — I think I'm ready to accept Jesus!'" she said.

Now, Kathy eagerly continues inviting students into the community she loves and into relationship with Jesus. She saw how simple invitations can help people find a place of belonging and how that belonging can lead to being transformed by Jesus.+



More Formed by Scripture

A ccording to the American Bible Society, Gen Z is the generation least familiar with the Bible. With your partnership, we are working to change that. You made it possible for students to gather in 2,431 small group Bible studies this year. And the number of students attending small groups increased by 10 percent. They were able to ask difficult questions and respond to Jesus as they dug into his Word.



Silbano, now a first-year InterVarsity campus minister, is uniquely positioned to help students meet Jesus through Scripture because he was transformed by God through InterVarsity Bible studies as a student.

After growing up in poverty, gang violence, and drug dealing, Silbano was ready for



a reset. He gave his life to Jesus between rounds of incarceration, attracted to the idea of a Savior who died for him. When he was released from prison, he began college at California State University, Bakersfield. As an older student who had been through much more than his classmates, Silbano searched for a place where he could belong and explore his new faith despite his background. More than anything, he wanted a way to make sense of the Bible, which he found overwhelming and confusing.



"This is how illiterate I was in the Bible: I didn't even know there was an Old and New Testament," Silbano said. "InterVarsity taught me everything I know. Everything I was hungry for, InterVarsity gave it to me."

Through joining InterVarsity when he first came to campus as a student and attending inductive Bible studies, Silbano learned to study Scripture and deepened his understanding of what it meant to follow Jesus. He began seeking to live a life like his.

Silbano is passionate about journeying with students looking for hope. He knows the transformational power of Scripture and loves watching students who are hungry for finding purpose in Christ like he did. +





More Incarnational

ntudents like Chloe do not have to wait until they graduate to be world changers. They can be agents of change wherever they are, even now. Through your support, every part of campus is being transformed as students boldly embody the love of Christ in their classes, clubs, and dorms, living incarnationally like Jesus.

Chloe is a musical theatre major at the University of Northern Colorado. Even though nothing made her happier than singing and dancing, her passion for performing arts and her faith seemed like two different worlds. But then her InterVarsity campus minister suggested starting a Bible study for arts students.

"I would have never thought that performing arts and Bible study would go together. Yet those are two huge aspects of my life."



Chloe's classmates surprised her with their willingness to join her Bible study. After a few months, they began to see themselves as people created and loved by God, instead of putting all their value in their performances. "If we don't get that part in the show, are we still okay? [We learned that] we are because Jesus is what's important," she said.

Chloe realized she could bring her faith into the performing arts. She stayed immersed in her classes, ready to invite others to explore Jesus. "Bringing up Jesus in a performing arts setting is kind of scary," she said. "A lot of people have different opinions about religion. So, it's about breaking down those barriers and bringing Jesus' name into those spaces. It's not about me...everyone needs to hear the good news about Jesus." +



More Servant-hearted

A students become more like Jesus, we see ripple effects from one student to the next and the next. Just as Jesus' disciples made more disciples, so did the 844 student leaders who poured into younger or newer leaders this year.

When Lucas started college at the University of Wisconsin–Madison, he was taking "a break from Christian things." He grew up in a ministry family who always hosted Bible studies and gatherings in their home. And while he still believed in God, Lucas was cynical, burnt out, and drained.

But when he met InterVarsity students, something felt different. "One of the blessings was seeing people so passionate for God that are my age," he said. Lucas was inspired by upperclassmen who invested in him his freshman year. They were persistent and committed to





ministering to the campus even through rebuilding the chapter and the challenges of COVID.

As a small group leader himself, Lucas' faith was accelerated even more, both by those who led him and those he led. Seeing how transformative of a season this was for him, he gained a deep desire to develop other student leaders, hoping to "wash their feet the way Jesus did."

Lucas saw God work through him as his InterVarsity chapter grew and the new leaders he shepherded reached students on campus who were open and curious about Jesus. "You have to trust the promise that God gave you when leading. The path I took was exactly purposed by God for this very reason." +





More Faithful



Being more like Jesus means being faithful, enduring in love and passion to be a part of redeeming the world. Your partnership helps InterVarsity develop students who will shape their workplaces, neighborhoods, and families for years to come. We want alumni like Kelsey to continue growing as disciples after college, using their gifts wherever God leads them.

This year, 23,383 core (came to half of ministry activities or more) students and faculty participated in InterVarsity's ministry to be shaped and launched into the world as faithful disciples.

Kelsey started following Jesus after an InterVarsity event at Florida State University (FSU). She soon discovered her calling as a worship leader. "The Lord highlighted specific giftings. He was caring for me by saying,



'This is who I made you to be,'" she said.

Throughout the rest of college, Kelsey realized her decision to follow Jesus would direct the rest of her life. Driven by his purposes for her and equipped with all God taught her in InterVarsity, she sought to be obedient and trust the Lord, even in seasons of questions and uncertainty.



A Lifetime of Being "All In"

L ike many InterVarsity students, Len Andyshak met the Lord in college. "I learned what it meant to know him versus know about him," Len said. He also learned that Jesus had a purpose for his life — a mission. And soon after graduating, Len began a 50-year journey of continually discovering that mission as an InterVarsity staff.

Len's staff career has taken him across the country and across the world, from Virginia to Tennessee to Oregon to Ukraine to Kansas. In each place, God used Len in extraordinary ways.

At the University of the South, by the time Len left, 10 percent of the campus was involved in InterVarsity. At the end of his time at Oregon State University, there were nearly a dozen active Bible studies.

God moved similarly when Len said yes to serving as InterVarsity Link staff in Ukraine. The Ukrainian student movement, CCX, was brand new when Len arrived. 30 years later, nearly 2,000 students are involved.

After two years of serving in Ukraine, Len returned to the U.S. to start an International Student Ministry at the University of Kansas where he served for 23 years with constant enthusiasm. "Every year, he said, "I met new students, and I was all in again."

Len is humbled by how God continuously opened doors for him, allowing him to be


part of his beautiful plan for the campus. "I'm really not an impressive person. I felt like I was in the center of a tornado, and everything was spinning around me," he said. "But it was the Holy Spirit doing things. And I got to be there."

Now, as he looks back on his life's work of serving students and faculty, Len has no regrets. "It's really worth following Jesus your whole life," he said. "If I found out I was going to die next week, I'd go, *Wow, what a great life I've had,* rather than being worried about leaving or having regrets for what never happened. I'm amazed God has loved me this long, with this deep sense of purpose and joy."

Over 63,000 students and faculty were impacted by InterVarsity's ministry this year. Just like Len's story of faithfulness, that could not have happened without your help. 
